


GLORIFYING GOD IN DIFFICULT TIMES

Matthew 5.16

A Biblical Response:

- ➤ Mankind all humanity is created in the image of God.
 - ▶ Genesis 1.26-27
- ➤ Each member of humanity is a person of intrinsic value and worth.
 - ▶1 Peter 2.17
 - ▶"fix a valuation upon... to honour, value" (Strong)
- ➤ We must be willing to cross society's illformed lines.
 - ▶ Jesus exemplified this Mark 1.40f; John 4,8
 - ▶ Jesus called for this John 17.20ff; Mark 16.15





A Practical Response:

Be willing to listen — James 1.19-20

Make sure you have the facts — Proverbs 18.13,17

Speak the truth — Colossians 3.9f (notice v11)

Consider your words and actions — Colossians 4.5

Speak graciously — Colossians 4.6



Romans 12.18

- ➤ Avoid the blame game.
 - ► Adam/Eve; Saul/Israelites
- ➤ Be willing to give the benefit of the doubt.
 - ▶1 Corinthians 13.5
- ➤ The older son was not minimized or dismissed when the father sought his brother.
 - **▶ Luke 15.31f**
- ➤ We need to seek to be understanding to the experiences of others.
 - Matthew 7.12

We're not dealing with external hypotheticals:

The year is 2013... I am seeking out a ministry position. I send a resume to a congregation in Texas. I receive a phone call from an elder who is excited to fly me and my wife to Texas to meet with the congregation. Our phone call was great. He asks me to email a picture of myself and my family to him so he can show the congregation who would be coming to preach.

Not 5 minutes after I send the picture I receive a phone call. He calmly begins, "Now, I'm not racist, but..." This is where a lot of conversations break down. This is where I begin tuning people out. He explains that the area and the congregation may not be ready for a black minister. "I couldn't tell you were black over the phone, or I would have told you then," he says as if it is a perfectly normal and non-racist thing to say.

We're not dealing with external hypotheticals:

The year is 2019. I move my family away from the job I took in Georgia where I had fantastic elders and wonderful friends in order to work with the church in another state. A salary is set and we have moved. An elder shows up to my door explaining that some people have come forward with issues with bringing in a black minister (I have already moved my family.) This was how I lost my job before I began it. One elder tells me that they are fine with having a white congregation and they needed all of those congregants to still be there if they were going to be able to afford their move into a new building. Bringing me in could make some of the white members with larger pockets leave.


