# FOUR CRIES OF THE CHRIST

## JOHN 7.28

Context of the Feast of Booths (7.2)

"This feast occurred in the early autumn (September or early October), and lasted for seven days... Its significance was twofold. It was a harvest-home festival, and hence was called *the Feast of Ingathering*, and it commemorated the dwelling of Israel in tents or booths in the wilderness.

Hence the name *Feast of Booths* or *Tabernacles*."

#### JOHN 7.28

- Context of the Feast of Booths (7.2)
- The Jews were seeking Jesus (7.11), either to harm or kill Him (5.16,18).
  - Undeterred, Jesus began teaching in the temple (7.14).
  - Some come close to accepting Jesus (7.26).
- Jesus then cried out:
  - They knew Him and where He was from.
  - He knew the Father because He was from the Father.

### JOHN 7.37

- Same context as 7.28 Feast of Booths
- On the last day, Jesus cries out again:
  - The reference to water was entirely appropriate.
  - He is able to quench the deepest thirst.
  - Jesus would cause waters to flow forth from others.
- Jesus cries out for us to recognize Him as the answer to the realest needs of mankind.

### JOHN 12.44

- The context is the last few days of Jesus' life.
- Jesus spoke with zeal and passion:
  - To believe in Him was to believe in the Father.
  - He identified Himself a light in a dark world.
  - He revealed the path to avoiding judgment.
  - He affirmed the perfect unity He had with the Father.
- Jesus cries out for us to hear His words and do them!

#### MATTHEW 27.50

- Jesus cries out from the cross:
  - We know what Jesus said by comparing John's account.
  - "It is finished!"
- What was finished?
  - His earthly ministry
  - The efforts to kill Him.
  - God's plan to save man through the sacrifice of His Son.
  - Jesus fulfilling God's plan.
